U.S. and China trade barbs after El Salvador cuts Taiwan ties (AFP-JIJI), Aug 24, 2018

BEIJING – China lashed out on Friday at "irresponsible" U.S. accusations that Beijing was destabilizing cross-Strait relations after El Salvador cut ties with Taiwan in favor of the Asian giant.

The White House also scolded the Central American country in a statement released Thursday, warning that the decision was made in a "non-transparent fashion" and affects "the economic health and security of the entire Americas region."

Taiwan and China have been engaged for years in a diplomatic tug-of-war in developing countries, with economic support and other aid often used as bargaining chips for diplomatic recognition.

"The United States will continue to oppose China's destabilization of the cross-Strait relationship and political interference in the Western Hemisphere," the White House said. "The El Salvadoran government's receptiveness to China's apparent interference in the domestic politics of a Western Hemisphere country is of grave concern to the United States, and will result in a reevaluation of our relationship with El Salvador."

Beijing sees self-ruling, democratic Taiwan as part of its territory to be brought back into the fold and has not ruled out using force to do so. Relations between Taipei and Beijing have worsened since Tsai Ing-wen became Taiwan's president in 2016, as her government refuses to acknowledge the island is part of "one China." China has stepped up its poaching of Taiwan's

dwindling official allies, with El Salvador becoming the fifth diplomatic loss under Tsai's presidency and the third this year.

Chinese foreign ministry spokesman Lu Kang said on Friday that El Salvador's decision to adhere to the "one China principle" was "right, proper and aboveboard." "Some country takes this and makes irresponsible remarks, is this not interfering in the internal affairs of El Salvador? Isn't this, rather, politically meddling in the region? This is self-evident," Lu told a regular news briefing.

While most countries have established formal ties with Beijing rather than Taipei in recent decades, Taiwan still has unofficial relationships with powerful countries. Its most important unofficial ally is the US, which remains Taiwan's leading arms supplier, despite switching diplomatic recognition to Beijing in 1979. Ties have warmed between the U.S. and Taiwan in recent months, incensing Beijing.

Some analysts saw the poaching of El Salvador as an indirect slap in the face to the Trump administration and a warning against further friendly overtures.

Combatant Command in the Spotlight Southern Command (USNORTHCOM)



United States Northern Command (USNORTHCOM) is a Unified Combatant Command (one of ten) of the U.S. military tasked with providing military support for civil authorities in the U.S., and protecting the territory and national interests of the United States within the contiguous United States, Alaska (not Hawaii), Puerto Rico, Canada, Mexico, The Bahamas, and the air, land and sea approaches to these areas. It is the U.S. military command

which, if applicable, would be the primary defender against a mainland invasion of the United States.

Commander, U.S. Northern Command is concurrently Commander of the U.S.-Canadian North American Aerospace Defense Command (NORAD). The two are co-located at Peterson Air Force Base in Colorado Springs, Colorado. USNORTHCOM headquarters has approximately 1,200 uniformed and civilian members, and few permanent forces. Forces from all branches of the U.S. military may be assigned to the Command as needed to complete its mission.

USNORTHCOM exercises command and control of two subordinate unified commands, four service component commands, and several standing Joint Task Forces (JTFs).

The subordinate unified commands are Special Operations Command-North, which was activated on 31 December 2012, and Alaskan Command, which was transferred from US Pacific Command (USPACOM) control to USNORTHCOM control on 1 October 2014. **USNORTHCOM** service include components U.S. Fifth Army/ARNORTH, First Air Force/AFNORTH, USFF/NAVNORTH, and U.S. Marine Corps **Forces** Reserve/MARFORNORTH.

USNORTHCOM's Joint Task Forces include Joint Force Headquarters National Capital Region, Joint Task Force-Civil Support, and Joint Task Force North. USNORTHCOM was created on 25 April 2002 when President George W. Bush approved a new Unified Command Plan, following the September 11 attacks. USNORTHCOM went operational on 1 October 2002.

The support that USNORTHCOM provides to civil authorities is legally limited by the Posse Comitatus Act, which sets some limits on the role of the U.S. military in civilian law enforcement. However, in case of national emergency, natural or man-made, its Air Forces Northern National Security Emergency Preparedness Directorate will take charge of the situation or event.

DOD Systems You Might Not Know Littoral Combat Ships

Two new littoral combat ships join the US fleet (By: David B. Larter)

WASHINGTON — The U.S. Navy added a pair of littoral combat ships to the fleet, accepting delivery of the Sioux City and the Wichita during a Wednesday ceremony at Fincantieri's Marinette Marine shipyard.

The ships, the sixth and seventh of Lockheed Martin's monohulled Freedom-variant LCS, will commission later this fall and are destined to be

based in Mayport, Florida, as part of LCS Squadron Two.

Over the next few years, the Navy will start accepting littoral combat ships at a fever pitch as the fleet builds up to the programmed 32 hulls, and likely more depending on the outcome of this year's appropriations process in Congress. With the acceptance of Sioux City and Wichita, the Navy has 15 LCS in its inventory.

The rapid buildup of the fleet also puts pressure on the surface warfare community to get its newly reorganized LCS program up and running.

Vice Adm. Richard Brown, head of Naval Surface Force Pacific, told Defense News in mid-August that four ships will be available for deployments in 2019, and that the community was finalizing the advanced predeployment training for the crews.

As for Marinette, the shipbuilder is making rapid progress on several other LCS. The Indianapolis, St. Louis, Minneapolis-Saint Paul, and Cooperstown are all under construction. The shipbuilder has also begun fabrication of the future LCS Marinette. The future Nantucket will begin fabrication in the fall.

Across the program, 29 LCS have been awarded, with 15 delivered to the Navy, 11 in various stages of construction and three in preproduction states, according to a release from Naval Sea Systems Command.

The Senate is currently weighing whether to appropriate two new LCS in 2019, one more than the Navy asked for in its budget — a proposition that drew a strong objection from the White House. President Donald Trump's budget director, Mick Mulvaney, said in a letter that one LCS, combined with the ships already in the pipeline, would keep both Marinette shipbuilder Independence-variant Austal USA, based in Mobile, Alabama, afloat while the Navy switches gears to its new frigate program.
